

A Level Fine Art is a unique opportunity that offers a wide range of skills and an opportunity to broaden your knowledge of Art and Artists. You will be required to develop the knowledge, skills and understanding undertaken in Fine Art:

- Concepts such as figuration, representation and abstraction
- How the formal elements evoke response in the viewer
- Various forms of presentation in Fine Art and the ways that audiences may respond or interact with them
- Sustainable materials and production processes int he construction of work
- The potential of collaborative working methodsologies int he creative process
- Developing skills and techiques, understanding paint qualities, experimenting with materials,
 ideas and techniques
- Gaining confidence in abilityin creative thinking and problem solving.

Drama and Theatre

The aim of the Drama and Theatre course is to develop your interest and enjoyment in drama and theatre both as active participants and as informed members of an audience, fostering an enthusiasm for, and critical appreciation of, the subject. The social, cultural and historical influences on the development of drama and theatre are also explored in each component, along with the study of key theatre practitioners.

2) Review the chosen live theatre production in a 750 to 1000 word essay, using analysis and evaluation to cover ACTING and DESIGNING aspects of the performance.



Writing a Play Review:



Writing a play review involves both analytical and creative skills. You need to communicate your assessment of the production in a way that engages your readers and provides them with a holistic understanding of the theatrical performance. It is important to structure your review to include an introduction, a plot summary, an analysis of the production, a critique of the performances, a commentary on the staging, and a conclusion.

Remember, a good play review doesn't just offer a personal opinion. Instead, it provides an objective analysis that can enlighten other spectators, help them make informed decisions, and contribute to the wider conversation about theatre and drama



Exam Board

Specification



The Introduction- give the basic information about the play – the title, the playwright, the director, the place and time of the performance.

Plot Summary- be concise, avoiding too many spoilers.

Production Analysis- a critique of the director's interpretation, the set design, the lighting, the sound, the costumes, and other technical aspects.

Performance Evaluation- focus on the acting – the

performance Evaluation- focus on the acting – the actors' interpretation of their roles, their stage presence, and their interaction with each other.

Commentary on the staging- considers the scenic arrangement, the use of space, and the overall visual aesthetics.

Conclusion- sums up your overall impression of the play, its strengths and weaknesses, and whether or not you would recommend it to others.

English Literature








Independent Research.

Geography

This engaging, relevant and dynamic course gives students the opportunity to discuss big questions such as:

What will be the impacts of climate change?

How many people can our planet support?

How is the world governed?

You will study the relationship between human populations and our physical environment at a variety of scales from the local to the global. You will consider your own role in relation to themes and issues being studied and the roles, values and attitudes of others including decision makers. You will design your own individual investigation and carry out fieldwork.



History

The course is designed to offer you the opportunity to study at least 200 years of History. The British unit focuses on economic, social and political democratic developments in the period c1780-1885, which transformed Britain as a nation. This provides a contrast with the depth study which explores the failure of democracy during a period of economic, social and political crisis and the rise of Nazism. The Historical Investigation provides students with a chance to investigate a period of 100 years of their choice.








Maths and Further Maths

In the A-Level, you will build on your Algebra, Geometry and Trigonometry skills in addition to discovering calculus. You will apply your mathematical skills when studying the areas of Statistics and Mechanics. Mathematical reasoning and problem solving will also be a prominent feature of the course.

Further Maths is studied in conjunction with the A-Level. You will have the opportunity to discover new areas of Maths whilst developing a more in depth understanding of concepts covered in the standard Mathematics A-Level. You will study Further Pure Maths ideas and modules covering Further Mechanics, Statistics, modelling of algorithms and numerical methods. Problem solving and Mathematical reasoning will feature prominently throughout this course.





Psychology

Psychology is the 'scientific study of the mind and behaviour.' A-Level Psychology will provide you with the skills required of an undergraduate — an inquiring mind and the ability to use scientific research findings to support and challenge various claims about why people behave the way that they do. It focuses on knowledge and understanding of concepts, theories and studies from a wide range of topics such as internal mental processes involved in perception and intelligence, to the causes of mental disorders.



Religious Studies

This course seeks to develop knowledge and understanding of philosophy, religion and ethics alongside the skills of enquiry, reflection and critical analysis; it is a subject that provides excellent preparation for most subjects at university. You will enjoy the opportunity to develop your own opinions and ideas during the course.



Suggested Summer Reading

Our three units are very distinct from each other. We start with Buddhism, so restrict your reading to that over the summer. If you are thinking about RS — which you should be as it's a rigorously academic, hard currency subject (people get into Oxbridge every year with this as an A Level), email me (Mr Abbotts, AAbbotts@dhsg.co.uk) with your interest and I will send you my own background to the life of the Buddha (which is better than anything you'll find anywhere else (ahem...)

A good next step book is **Siddhartha, by Herman Hesse**. It's also a terrific introduction to Hesse, he's a great writer! The book is fictional, but inspired by the life of the Buddha. You can also read it in 3-4 hours. Look for the version with a **foreword by the excellent John Peacock** (£8.99 new) – avoid the one by Paulo Coelho.

Also excellent is **The Life of the Buddha by H. Saddhatissa**. It's out of print but going second hand from £3.61 on Amazon. I generally recommend not going too far into the teachings beyond the limits of this book at this stage.

An exception to what I just said may be the wonderful **Buddhism by Denise Cush**. Written with A Level in mind she writes SO clearly and is easily digestible – though you may not want to stray too far into the teachings at this stage.



Top Tip...this is an essay-based subject. As soon as A Level begins you will be producing 1,000+-word essays. Be ready to work hard and do lots of background reading, especially in those books I will (in September) ask to you read in tandem with the course.







Useful advice:

Do NOT attempt to learn about

Buddhism from the internet. There are so
many different kinds of Buddhism out
there – some of which are very dubious,
plus people have set themselves up as
authorities who have no right to do so. At
the end of the course you will be able to
tell the difference, but not yet.
